FEFP Legislative Changes

- The base student allocation (BSA) was increased by \$552.33.
- Several categorical allocations were removed from the FEFP and rolled into the BSA:
 - Classroom Teacher and Other Instructional Personnel Salary Increase
 - Evidence-Based Reading Allocation
 - Teacher Supplemental Assistance Program
 - Sparsity
 - Instructional Materials
 - Total Funds Compression and Hold Harmless
- The Mental Health Allocation was increased by \$20 million to a total of \$160 million.

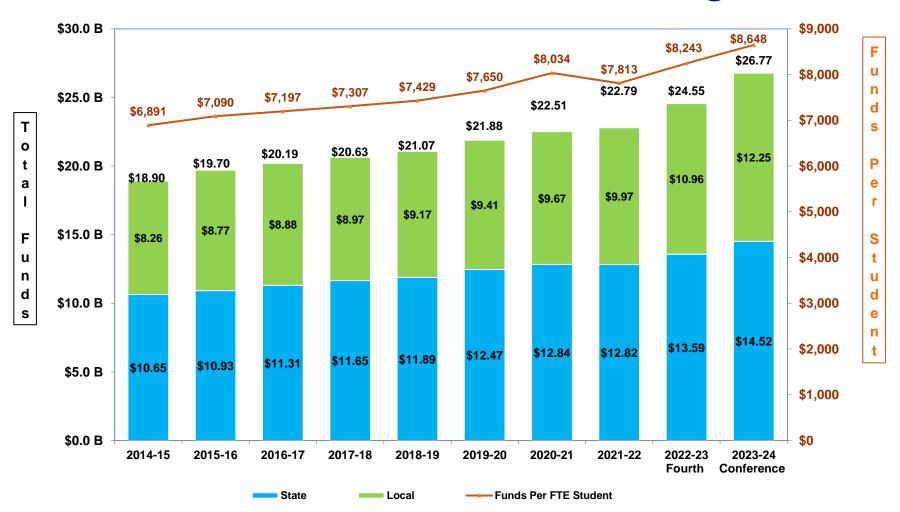


FEFP Legislative Changes

- The Safe Schools Allocation was increased by \$40 million to a total of \$250 million.
- Supplemental Academic Instruction (SAI) was renamed the Educational Enrichment Allocation (EEA) and expanded.
 - Turnaround is included within the EEA.
- The District Cost Differential (DCD) was replaced with the Comparable Wage Factor (CWF).
- A Small District Factor (SDF) was added to the Base Funding calculation.
- The Group 2 weighted full-time equivalent (WFTE) cap was removed from the FEFP.

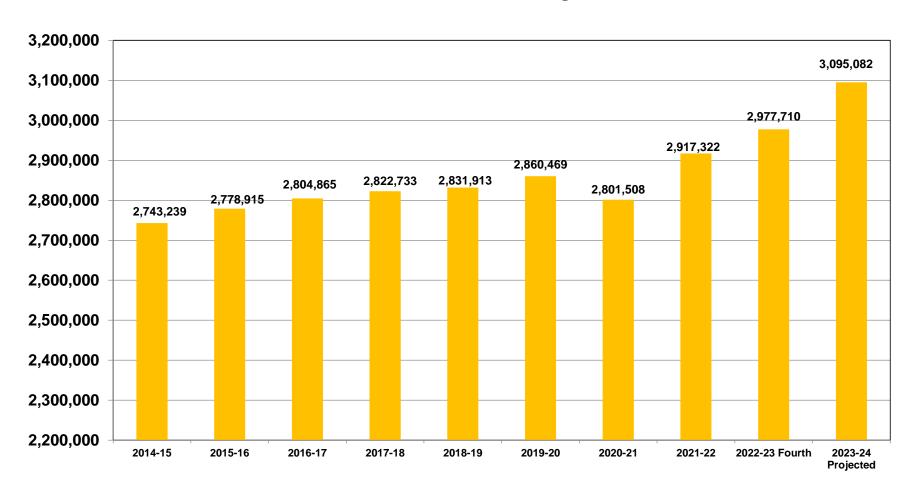


Historical Total FEFP Funding



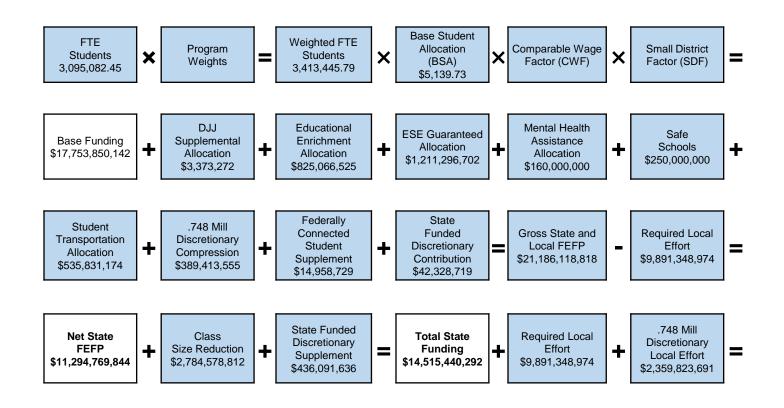


FTE History

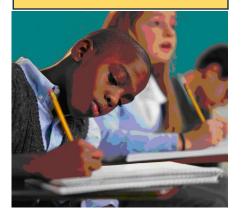

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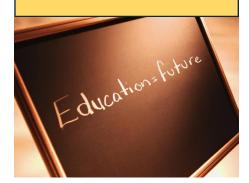
Base Funding

Base Funding

Weighted FTE x BSA x CWF x SDF = Base Funding.

Authority: s. 1011.62, F.S.

The Base Funding for the fiscal year 2023-2024 is \$17,753,850,142, around 66% of total operating funds.





Base Student Allocation (BSA)

Base Student Allocation The BSA is the dollar amount set annually by the legislature to provide FEFP base funding.

Authority: s. 1011.62(1) (b), F.S. The BSA for the fiscal year 2023-2024 is \$5,139.73.



Small District Factor

Small District Factor

> Authority: s. 1011.62(1), F.S.

The Small District Factor (SDF) is an adjustment that recognizes school districts with less than 20,000 FTE and are designated as fiscally constrained districts as described in s. 218.67(1), F.S.

The SDF is set at 1.0277 for the 2023-2024 year.

Comparable Wage Factor

Comparable Wage Factor

Authority: s. 1011.62(2), F.S. The Comparable Wage Factor (CWF) is an adjustment that recognizes differences in the cost of living among the school districts. The CWF is set at the greater of the calculated value or 1.000.



State Funded Discretionary

State Funded Discretionary Contribution

Authority: s. 1011.62(6), F.S. Provides \$42,328,719 for lab schools and Florida Virtual School Discretionary Contribution.

Lab schools and the Florida Virtual School (FLVS) are separate school districts for purposes of FEFP funding.

The funds for the lab schools and the FLVS are authorized in lieu of discretionary local tax revenue.





0.748 Mill Compression

0.748 Mill Discretionary Compression

Authority: s. 1011.62(5), F.S. Provides \$389,413,555 to fund any difference between:

- The amount generated by a 0.748 mill levy.
- An amount equal to the state average multiplied by the district's unweighted student enrollment.



Safe Schools

Safe Schools

Provides \$250,000,000 for safe school activities, with priority given to safeschool officers.

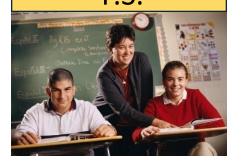
Each district receives a minimum allocation of \$250,000.

One-third of the remaining funds is allocated based on each district's crime index published by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement. Two-thirds is based on the district's non-virtual and non-scholarship unweighted student enrollment.



Educational Enrichment Allocation (EEA)

Provides \$825,066,525 for the EEA.

The EEA also includes funds for district-managed turnaround schools as identified in s. 1008.33(4)(a), F.S.



ESE Guaranteed Allocation

ESE Guaranteed Allocation

Authority: s. 1011.62(8), F.S.



Provides \$1,211,296,702 for educational programs and services for students with disabilities who require a low to moderate level of special services and for K-8 Gifted students.

These exceptional students also receive weighted FTE funding in the FEFP, using the appropriate Basic Program weight for their grade level.



Department of Juvenile Justice (DJJ) Supplemental Allocation

DJJ Supplemental Allocation

Authority: s. 1011.62(9), F.S.



Provides \$3,373,272 for the DJJ Supplemental Allocation.

These funds are used to supplement other sources of funding for students in juvenile justice education programs.

The allocation is based on the WFTE in the juvenile justice education programs multiplied by both the DJJ Factor (\$906.30) and the comparable wage factor.



Student Transportation

Student Transportation

Authority: s. 1011.68, F.S.



Provides \$535,831,174 for Student Transportation.

The Student Transportation funding formula provides funds for school district transportation based on each district's prorata share of state transported students.

 Adjustments are made for cost of living differences, percent of population outside of urban centers, and an efficiency factor that is based upon the average number of eligible students transported per bus in daily service to encourage greater bus utilization.

\$14,958,729 has been allocated for the Federally Connected Student Supplement.

- For students connected with federally owned military installations, National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) property and Indian lands.
- Must be eligible for federal Impact Aid Program funds under s. 8003 of Title
 VIII of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.

- Exempt Property Allocation: Capital Outlay Millage rate applied to value of exempt property.
- Student Allocation: All qualifying students receive 3% of the BSA (\$154). Qualifying students with disabilities receive an additional 10.5% of the BSA (\$540). Qualifying students are reported in Survey 3.



Mental Health Assistance Allocation

Authority: s. 1011.62(13), F.S. \$160,000,000 has been allocated for the Mental Health Assistance Allocation. Each district receives a minimum allocation of \$100,000.

Funds appropriated for the Mental Health Assistance Allocation are provided to school districts to help establish or expand school-based mental health care.



Salary Increase Allocation

Salary Increase Allocation

Authority: s. 1011.62(14), F.S. \$1,052,803,316 has been provided for the Classroom Teacher Salary and Other Instructional Personnel Salary Increase.

- These funds are included within the Base Funding Allocation.
- 4.52% of the base funding allocation is for maintaining prior year raises.
- 1.41% of the base funding allocation is for salary increases for classroom teachers and other instructional personnel, not including paraprofessionals.



Required Local Effort

Required Local Effort

Authority: s. 1011.62(4), F.S.



Required Local Effort (RLE) is the amount that each district is required by law to provide annually toward the cost of the Florida Education Finance Program.

The Legislature prescribes the aggregate RLE for all school districts collectively as an item in the General Appropriations Act.



Required Local Effort

Authority: s. 1011.62(4), F.S.



The total adjusted amount for RLE is \$9,891,348,974. This represents a state average RLE millage rate of 3.262. The millage rate is reduced for any district with ad valorem tax proceeds exceeding 90% of the district's FEFP formula entitlement.



Class Size Reduction (CSR) Categorical

\$2,784,578,812 is allocated to implement Class Size Reduction provisions of Section 1, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Florida.

Class Size Compliance

- Class Size Maximums:
 - PK-3 = 18; 4-8 = 22; 9-12 = 25.
- Measured at the classroom level for traditional public schools.
- Measured at the school-wide average for charter schools.
- Measured at the school-wide average for district-operated schools of choice.
- Class Size Compliance Plans are due to FDOE February 1.
 - Must include the signature of the district's school board designee or charter's school board designee.
- 2023-2024 Changes:
 - Family Empowerment Scholarship (FES) FTE was removed from this calculation.
 - The class size penalty was removed.



State-Funded Discretionary Supplement

State-Funded Discretionary Supplement

Authority: s. 1011.62(16), F.S. \$436,091,636 has been allocated for the State-Funded Discretionary Supplement.

Funds appropriated for the State-Funded Discretionary Supplement are to fund the non-voted discretionary millage for operations for students awarded a Family Empowerment Scholarship.

This is a 100% state-funded allocation.



Scholarship Programs

Family Empowerment Scholarships

Authority: s. 1002.394, F.S. The state reports FTE for students enrolled in the Family Empowerment Scholarship Program.

This FTE generates funding through the FEFP, which the department reduces by each student's scholarship amount in order to pay student scholarships.
